



Voting in Minnesota with a Criminal Conviction

**Voter ID
is not
required
in the
2012
election**

If you were convicted of a felony in Minnesota or any other state and as of Election Day you are **NOT** incarcerated, on probation, on parole, or supervised release, **YOU CAN VOTE!** In fact, the minute you have completed your felony sentence and are **"off paper"**, you can register to vote OR you can register at your polling place on Election Day.

If you were convicted of a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor you **NEVER** lose your right to vote. If you are in jail on Election Day, you have the right to vote by absentee ballot.

VOTING IS IMPORTANT—it is your chance to choose who represents you, your family, and your community. If you have been convicted of a felony, be absolutely certain that your sentence has expired before registering to vote or voting.
